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Message from the Director

Dear Friends.

With our 2024 Impact Report, I want to take a moment to reflect on what we've accomplished together. While the presidential outcome was not what any of us had hoped for, our wins in the states underscore the power of grassroots organizing and the enduring impact of our efforts. In 2016, Democrats held majorities in just 29 state legislative chambers. Now, they control nearly 40.

All of this is thanks to you. This year, we were able to endorse more candidates than ever before, and reach out to more than **2 million** voters, making a whopping **62% of calls** for our top targeted candidates. We generated over **\$2 million** to elect state lawmakers and boost our local organizing partners, raising an average of **13% of total contributions** for our top targeted campaigns. We provided best-in-class campaign services and critical strategic advice, rooted in the latest data and research. And 83% of our candidates were women or nonbinary, 43% were people of color, and 28% had never run for a state legislative seat before.

Together, we flipped critical seats in the **North Carolina House** and the **Wisconsin Senate**,
breaking GOP supermajorities and ensuring that
Democratic governors can protect voting rights,
abortion access, and so much more. In **Pennsylvania**, we defended our hard-fought

Democratic majority in the House; in **Georgia**, your support fueled digital ad campaigns that encouraged voters to show up for downballot candidates; and in **Minnesota**, we preserved Democratic control in a pivotal special election. Altogether, **we endorsed 53 candidates in 9 states and won 31 races**—an impressive feat in today's polarized landscape.

Our wins this year, along with our work over the last eight years, are an integral part of the Democratic power that will serve as a critical bulwark against the threats of a second Trump administration and Project 2025.

None of this would be possible without you. Every phone call made, postcard written, and dollar donated played a role in strengthening our democracy. You've proven once again that ordinary people, when united by a shared vision, can achieve extraordinary things.

As we look ahead, we carry the lessons of this cycle forward. The road to a more just and equitable future runs through state legislatures, and we're already laying the groundwork for 2026.

From the bottom of my heart, thank you for your passion, your resilience, and your belief in this movement. Together, we are making history.

With Republicans now in control of the White House and both houses of Congress, and the incoming Trump administration having pledged to gut federal power and continue transferring power to the states, our mission to build power in state legislatures is more important than ever to make progress on key issues, from abortion to climate to democracy itself.


Outperforming the Top of the Ticket



In 2016, Democrats held majorities in just 29 state legislative chambers. Today, they control nearly 40.

The power that we collectively built in the states largely withstood the rightward shift at the top of the ticket in 2024— a testament to the last eight years of massive organizing and movement-building spurred by the first Trump administration.

Although the presidential race did not go as any of us had hoped, Sister District and Democrats saw critical downballot wins that will have a tangible impact on millions of lives.

Chamber Victories

Sister District endorsed 53 candidates (our most ever!) in 9 states and won 31 races. Our candidates ran in some of the most competitive races in the country, with over half decided by less than 5%, and 30% decided by less than 3% of votes. Our wins were a critical part of major chamber victories, including:



Breaking the GOP supermajority in the North Carolina House.

We worked with Dante Pittman to flip North Carolina HD-24, which helped Democrats break the supermajority and give incoming Democratic Governor Josh Stein veto power.



Breaking the Republican supermajority in the Wisconsin Senate.

We worked with Jodi Habush Sinykin and Kris Alfheim, two critical pickups that broke the supermajority and set the stage for Democrats to flip when the rest of the chamber is up in 2026.



Maintaining control of the Pennsylvania House.

We worked with Representative Mandy Steele on her successful reelection bid, which was crucial to ensuring that Democrats maintained their very narrow control of the House.



Maintaining control of the Minnesota Senate.

We supported Sister District alumna Ann Johnson Stewart, who won the Minnesota SD-45 special election, keeping the Minnesota Senate blue.







Senator-Elect Bradley ran as a first-time candidate for the North Carolina Senate taking on a longtime Republican activist under heavily gerrymandered maps. She ran a principled campaign centered on reproductive rights, commonsense gun safety, and strong public schools—and won by an incredible 181 votes.

History Made in Arizona



LORENA AUSTIN AZ LD-9 HOUSE

In 2024 we endorsed Representative Austin for the second time. Rep. Austin fought boldly against a MAGA extremist, advocating for affordable housing, climate justice, LGBTQIA+ rights, and more. Winning by fewer than 4,000 votes, Rep. Austin made history as the first openly nonbinary legislator reelected to the Arizona House.

Rep. Austin also participated in our Purple District Network program, and we partnered with *Teen Vogue* to profile their campaign in the lead-up to the election.



Sister District community raised \$120,118 and reached out to 120,477 voters to help Rep. Austin win. Although we were not able to flip Arizona this time, we continue to build on our years of engagement in the state to work toward future flips.

Outperforming Trump in Wisconsin



LEE SNODGRASS WI AD-52

Assemblywoman Snodgrass unapologetically ran as one of the few LGBTQIA+ members of the Wisconsin Assembly. Despite representing a district that voted for Trump, she secured a hard-fought victory by fewer than 5.000 votes.

This is our second time supporting this outstanding candidate. In 2024, the Sister District community raised nearly 30% of her campaign's budget, with an average donation of just \$27. Our Sister District Chicago team also traveled to Wisconsin, knocking on over 1,000 doors to help secure her win.



Representative Dr. Jasmine Clark is a microbiologist and professor at Emory University. Rep. Dr. Clark has long been a strong advocate for reproductive rights, voting rights, environmental protection, public education, and more. In 2024, Sister District volunteers raised nearly 10% of her campaign's total budget, reached out to 47,762 voters, and hosted Rep. Dr. Clark at a packed fundraiser in Davis, CA.



Combatting Downballot Roll-Off

In 2024, we took on an ambitious project that is fundamental to building power in the states: understanding and combating downballot roll-off, which happens when voters tick the top, but not the bottom, of their ballots.

State legislative races are often decided by just a few hundred—or even a few dozen—votes. By convincing just a fraction of existing Democratic voters to vote all the way down their ballots for state legislative races, we could see significant changes in electoral outcomes.

This year, Democratic state legislative candidates notched key wins, outperforming the top of the ticket in some place, and benefiting from an increase in roll-off among Republican voters. Deeper analysis will take time, but Democratic voters are beginning to understand the importance of voting downballot.

Phase 1: Identifying Who Rolls Off and Why

In the first phase of the project, we partnered with Data for Progress. We discovered a stark difference in state legislative roll-off between the two parties. Historically, Democrats tend to experience much more roll-off than their Republican counterparts.

We publicly shared our research findings about the roots of roll-off behavior: who roll-off voters are, and the beliefs about states and state-level voting that deter them from voting all the way downballot.

Phase 2: Messaging to Get Out the Downballot Vote

The second phase of this project put our research findings into action.

We used the foundation of our research to develop a new, comprehensive resource: the **Downballot Voter Toolkit**, which provides effective, research-backed materials, including messaging guidelines and downloadable static and video ads, to encourage voters to vote all the way down the ballot. All assets are free and available to the public.



The Ads

The video ad, "Determination," (above) motivates and empowers voters to vote all the way down the ballot. Six static ads (images) are also available for use (seen on next page). Our collaborators at A—B Partners created and tested all ads.








Our State Bridges program lays the groundwork for electoral victories in key states by elevating the profile of and fundraising for local power-building organizations.

Since launching this program in 2021, we have **raised nearly \$900k** for our partner organizations, including **\$384,874** in **2024** alone. Many of our volunteers also become loyal donors, growing our partners' network of supporters nationwide.

Chamber Outcomes

Pennsylvania

Democrats held the one-seat majority in the Pennsylvania House. This outcome is especially impressive considering that every statewide race on the ballot (president, U.S. Senate, attorney general, auditor general, and state treasurer) went to the Republican.

We have worked in Pennsylvania since 2018, supporting candidates and local organizations. Some highlights of our work in 2024 and over the last four cycles include:

- ► Supported 3 winning candidates of 4 total in 2024
- ▶ Made 22 endorsements since 2018
- ► Invested \$1,193,351 in state legislative races
- ► Invested \$204,049 in State Bridges partners since 2021
- ► Provided support and training to 8 legislators through our Purple District Network

North Carolina

Democrats broke the right-wing supermajority in the House of Representatives, giving Democratic Governor-elect Josh Stein veto power. Our four candidates fought hard races in the state with incredibly narrow wins, including one who won her race by just 181 votes.

We have worked in North Carolina since 2020, supporting candidates and local organizations. Some highlights of our work in 2024 and over the last three cycles include:

- ► Supported 3 winning candidates of 4 total in 2024
- ▶ Made 10 endorsements since 2020
- ► Invested \$581,887 in state legislative races
- ► Invested \$37,806 in State Bridges partners since 2021
- ► Provided support and training to 13 legislators through our Purple District Network

Wisconsin

Democrats broke the Republican supermajority in the Senate. When the rest of the chamber is up for grabs in two years, we now are within striking distance of a flip. And, in the Assembly, we went from a 15-seat deficit to needing just 5 seats to gain a majority in 2026.

We have worked in Wisconsin since 2020, supporting candidates and local organizations. Some highlights of our work in 2024 and over the last three cycles include:

- ► Supported 9 winning candidates of 14 total in 2024
- ▶ Made 18 endorsements since 2020
- ► Invested \$506,969 in state legislative races
- ► Invested \$157,902 in State Bridges partners since 2021
- ► Provided support and training to 5 legislators through our Purple District Network

Minnesota

Democrats **held the Senate majority.** We supported Ann Johnson Stewart, who we first helped get elected in 2020, in a mustwin special election this year. We also supported two winning candidates in the House. Democrats lost three seats in the House to bring the total makeup to a tie, however this is still a net gain over 2016—when Republicans held a 20-seat majority.

We worked in Minnesota in 2020 and 2025, supporting 5 candidates in 6 races. During those two cycles, we invested \$119,280 yielding 5 winning campaigns. We have also provided support and training to 5 legislators through our Purple District Network.

Arizona

Democrats faced difficult headwinds in Arizona this year. Trump won the presidential race there by 52.2%, and Vice President Harris received only 46.7% of the vote. Still, **3 of our 7 candidates won**—including a challenger, Kevin Volk, who flipped his Tucson-area seat from red to blue. Overall, Democrats lost a net of 1 seat in the Senate and 2 seats in the House.

Nevada

This was Sister District's second cycle working in Nevada, where we supported three candidates total—two for the second time since 2022. Our two alumnae candidates won their races, while our third endorsee, Dallas Harris, lost by fewer than 900 votes—an incredibly narrow 1.17% loss. This year, Democrats held on to confident majorities in both chambers but were unable to achieve a veto-proof supermajority to insulate against Republican Governor Joe Lombardo.

Michigan

Though a Democratic success story for the last several cycles, this year Trump won Michigan by just over 80,000 votes. Downballot was no different, and Democrats unfortunately lost their extremely narrow majority in the House of Representatives. We supported candidates in 8 races this year—6 of which were decided by less than a 10% margin.

Georgia

Although Biden narrowly carried the state in 2020, Trump took it with 50.7% of the vote this year. We supported four candidates in the House of Representatives, three of whom won—including our two alumnae candidates. In 2016, Republicans had a near-historic peak of control in the House, with 118 of 180 seats. Although they still hold a majority, their lead has narrowed considerably—having lost a net of 17 seats since 2016.

New Hampshire

Democrats needed to flip three seats in the Senate and four seats in the House in order to flip each chamber. Unfortunately, they lost some ground in both. We supported six candidates in the state, three of whom won. Three of our endorsed House races were decided by **margins of less than 1%**.





Candidate Services

Through our Campaign Services program, Sister District's political team provides individualized support to our candidates and their staff, leveraging their years of experience to help fill gaps. Campaigns view Sister District staff as experts on building strong field campaigns, offering both guidance and hands-on help to achieve campaign goals. This year, we completed more than 100 special projects, including:

- ► Building voter universes for candidates
- ► Helping candidates hire key staff
- ► Advising candidates on paid communications and digital strategies
- ► Helping candidates navigate vendor relationships
- ► Advising candidates on field and get-out-the-vote (GOTV) plans
- ► Hosting candidate messaging and communications trainings

Campaign satisfaction

We survey our candidates and their staff twice during the electoral cycle to assess how well we're doing and what we could improve. This year, our campaigns were highly satisfied with the work Sister District did to help their campaigns. People representing 39 campaigns responded. *This scale has a total of 10*.

Volunteers and Organizing

Sister District volunteers engage in a mix of activities, such as supporting our endorsed candidates through field and fundraising support, boosting our State Bridges partners with small dollar donations plus civic education and engagement. Most volunteers are organized into teams based on geography, and each team is assigned 1 to 3 candidates in a strategic state to support over an election cycle.

In 2024 we had:

- ▶ 14.399 new volunteers
- ► 71 chapters and affiliates
- ► 261 chapter leaders
- ▶ 546 phone banks
- ▶ 150 fundraisers
- ▶ 238 other events

Sister District Summit

In February, we held our Seventh Annual Summit, featuring conversations with alumni candidates along with workshops and panels for discussing pressing issues. The virtual event featured special guests, including **Arizona Governor Katie Hobbs**, a keynote fireside chat with **Wisconsin's former Lt. Governor Mandela Barnes**, and panels of youth activists, volunteer leaders, and fundraising and digital organizing specialists.

Volunteer Satisfaction

We survey our volunteer leaders twice during the electoral cycle to assess how well we're doing and what we could improve. This year, our volunteers were highly satisfied with being a part of the Sister District community and felt they truly contributed to our mission. This scale has a total of 10.



Fellowship Program

We hit another impressive milestone in 2024, with our most robust class of phone bank, GOTV, and fall organizing fellows yet. Participants completed a total of **32 fellowships** and a whopping 4,186 working hours. Our fellows—primarily high school students, college students, and career switchers—receive a generous paid stipend, and add critical capacity to our team while gaining valuable hands-on field experience to become future organizers, field and political directors, and campaign managers. Fellows supported our voter outreach, mobilization, candidate support, and digital efforts.

2024 was the fourth year the State Bridges program was in effect, and we:

- ► Held 2 virtual fundraiser events
- ► Supported 8 organizations in 4 states
- ► Raised \$385,669 for partners
 - -6,957 individual donations
 - -\$48,208 average donation per partner
- -\$98 average donation amount

Purple District Network (SDAN)

The Purple District Network is the only state legislator network that exclusively focuses on providing support to state legislators in frontline districts. We build community among these leaders and provide them with the tools they need to best serve their

communities. Cohorts are organized around the type of government the legislator is seated in—blue trifecta, red trifecta, or divided government—to promote targeted, actionable conversations.

Narrative Change (SDAN)

Sister District Action Network's Narrative Change program seeks to educate the public about the power and promise of states by offering excellent content and programs and building our brand as thought leaders, particularly through partnerships.

Downballot Roll-Off Research (SDAN)

One of our top research priorities was to craft a new narrative to compel Democratic voters to vote all the way down their ballots for state legislative candidates.

Building on our 2023 research with Data for Progress, in 2024 we developed and tested messaging and creative content designed to reduce roll-off by empowering and motivating liberals to vote for state legislative candidates.

Downballot Voter Toolkit

Our work resulted in a new, comprehensive resource: the Downballot Voter Toolkit, which officially launched in September. It provides effective, research-backed materials, including downloadable static and video ads, to combat roll-off and encourage voters to vote all the way down the ballot. All assets are free and available to the public, and we've disseminated the toolkit to a broad audience of partners and allied groups for sharing on social media or incorporating into GOTV programs. Highlights include:

Research Overview and Key Barriers

► Key findings about the roots of roll-off behavior: who roll-off voters are, and the

main attitudes about states and statelevel voting commonly held by this group of voters.

▶ Identifying the biggest barriers for roll-off voters, such as lack of confidence and low agency.

Messaging Guidance

▶ Insights from our own testing and general principles from prior messaging research to help craft messages that resonate with voters.

Top Performing Messages

- ▶ Reproductive Freedom: One of our strongest messages underlines the authority that state legislators have over the crucial issue of abortion. Many voters care deeply about this issue but do not realize that state legislators have the most power to determine reproductive freedom.
- ▶ Our Votes Can Make the Difference: This message drives home the idea that races at this level of the ballot can be extremely close. Sometimes fewer than 100 votes can flip seats and even entire chambers. In state legislative races, every vote absolutely matters. This message helps voters over the hurdle of feeling like their vote for state legislature doesn't matter (low agency).

The Ads

- ► The video ad, "Determination," motivates and empowers voters to vote all the way down the ballot.
- ➤ Six static ads (images) are also available for use. Our collaborators at A—B Partners created and tested all ads.

To officially launch the toolkit, Sister District hosted a virtual downballot strategy briefing with a diverse audience of nearly 200 donors, volunteers, partners, researchers, and lawmakers in attendance. As of October, more than 100 users, representing 69 different organizations and 25 states, had downloaded the ads.

Downballot Turnout Program

This year, for the first time ever, Sister District invested \$500k in independent expenditure dollars to deliver these messages in states with strong short- and medium-term opportunities for achieving gender parity: New Mexico, Ohio, and Tennessee. Indeed, New Mexico achieved a woman-majority legislature, joining the Nevada House and Senate as the only other women-led state legislative chambers in the country. We also partnered with United for Georgia Women, a project of GA State Representative and Sister District alumna Shea Roberts, investing \$25,000 to run the video ad in several key GA districts during the weeks before Election Day. In total, these two programs reached nearly 110k voters in critical districts.
